She has had the pleasure of meeting many new people in Canada and the United States.

Karen became very involved with the Pioneers in 1984 when Victoria Film's president, Paul Wroe, became a Pioneer board member and Karen volunteered to help. Before long she was involved in all Pioneer social activities. In 1988, Karen joined the Pioneers and in 1998, she received a Pioneer Ancillary Award. In 1999, she joined the Pioneer Board.

Over the years, the Canadian Picture Pioneers have greatly benefitted from Karen's energy, effort and enthusiasm. She has sold ads for the annual dinner programme book and worked on the dinner planning committee. Karen works on the golf tournament committee, particularly with Ian Shaw, to collect prizes and prepare and pack the popular Booty bags. Dianne Schwalm, Senior Vice President, Theatrical Advertising and Publicity for Warner Bros. Canada Inc., has spent more than three decades in the Canadian Motion Picture and Entertainment Industry. In her current position, Ms. Schwalm directs the Warner Bros. advertising, publicity and promotional activities for Canada. She also functions as a corporate liaison for Warner Bros. cultural investment activities.

Her motion picture and entertainment industry career began in 1970 where Ms. Schwalm was part of the sales department and advertising & publicity department at Paramount Pictures in Canada. She then joined 20th Century Fox in 1976 to assume the role of Canadian Director of Advertising and Publicity.

In 1980, Dianne Schwalm joined Warner Bros. as Director of Marketing and was promoted to Vice President of Theatrical Advertising and Publicity in 1990, the role she held until being appointed to her current position.

Ms. Schwalm's involvement reaches out to a number of industry-related and community organizations. She is a member of the Advisory Committee as well as a past member of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors of the Canadian Film Centre (CFC); a member of the Board of Directors of the Canadian Picture Pioneers; Co-founder as well as a member of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors of Canada's Walk of Fame; a founding member of Canadian Women in Communications (CWC); a past chairperson of Canadian Motion Picture Distributors Association Public Relations Committee; past president of the Women of the Motion Picture Industry (WOMPI); and a co-founder of the Academy of Canadian Cinema & Television's Golden Reel Awards. Ms. Schwalm has recently joined the Board of Directors of Women in Film & Television (WIFT - Toronto) and the McLuhan Multimedia Festival (M3F) a nation-wide high school media festival which helps students combine the older tradition of art with the modern traditions of technology. As well, Ms. Schwalm is a standing member of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences.

Dianne Schwalm was also instrumental in the start-up of the Canadian Living Foundation's Breakfast Club program and the establishment of Sheena's Place. Ms. Schwalm is on the Board of Directors of the Blue Jay Charitable Foundation, as well as being a past board member of Gilda's Club and the Canadian Tourettes Foundation. Ms. Schwalm recently co-chaired a Breast Cancer annual fundraiser and is a recipient of the Crystal Award from Women in Film and Television, as well as Women of Distinction Award for Mentorship from the YWCA.

On a personal note, Dianne Schwalm lives in Toronto with her husband Peter and three children, Jamie 21, Mary Beth 19 and Emily 17; and she is very supportive and actively involved in the alpine ski racing community provincially and nationally.
